However, there has still been plenty to report on.

Project Work

Chapel Corner Community Gardens – Trinity United Reformed Church



At the beginning of the month, we held a second planning meeting to discuss the social media and fundraising aspects of the project. We also finalised the schedule of works for the year 10 students from Ingfield Manor School, who will be joining us in a series of work parties starting in January, for a six-week period.

We have also met with a contractor regarding the hard landscaping aspect of the project and received their quotation of works and we are arranging to meet another contractor in January. We have also started to investigate grants and other funding opportunities.

We will be launching our social media channels in January and our campaign for volunteers to join the project.

Due to this being a large project and with lots of people being busy over the Christmas period, we have put some of our other projects on hold until the New Year.

Visits To The Elderly And Vulnerable

Often our role involves us supporting vulnerable members of the community with activities, advice, welfare checks and signposting. Some residents who live alone may at times find themselves in need of a little extra support and especially in the run up to Christmas, that can feel a lonely time for many. This month we have spent time supporting a resident with sight difficulties and visiting another resident to let them know about our Friday coffee mornings and about the Christmas Lunch being held on Christmas Day at the Billingshurst Centre by Billingshurst Family Church. This is in addition to other residents that we regularly check in with.

Whilst Out on Patrol

Operation Crackdown Report – School Crossing At Billingshurst Primary Academy

Whilst out on our early morning patrols on Friday 5th December we stopped outside the Primary School to monitor the parking, wish the pupils and parents a good day and to liaise with John who performs the School Crossing Patrol. Sadly, we were witness to a vehicle driving through the area and failing to stop for John who had his 'Stop' sign clearly displayed. We obtained the vehicle details and filed a report to Operation Crackdown on our return to the office.

School crossing patrol officers are better known as a 'lollipop' person. They are employed by West Sussex County Council to help children and other pedestrians cross the road safely when walking to and from school.

Failing to stop for a School Crossing Patrol (SCP) in West Sussex is a serious offence under the Road Traffic Act, meaning drivers must stop when the SCP shows their red 'STOP' sign, or face penalties including up to a £1,000 fine, 3 penalty points, and potentially a driving ban. West Sussex County Council advises drivers to obey SCP instructions, stop safely, and wait until the officer and children have cleared the road before moving off.

Festive Billingshurst Patrols

It has been an enjoyable month to be out and about conducted our patrols. From finding Santa hanging from the Adversane Beacon to enjoying the Christmas tree on the village green and the beautiful star on the St Mary's spire and the festive window displays in the village centre.



Fly Tipping



We found a dump of Nitrous oxide cannisters and balloons in Jubilee Fields – Nitrous oxide or 'Nos' is a Class C drug, which means it is illegal to have for yourself, to give away or sell. Possession can get you up to two years in prison, an unlimited fine, or both. Supplying someone else, even your friends, can get you up to fourteen years in prison, an unlimited fine, or both.

Like drink-driving, driving when high is dangerous and illegal. If you are caught driving under the influence, you may receive a heavy fine, driving ban, or prison sentence.

Criminal Damage To Refuse Bins At Amblehurst Green

This damage was reported to us and residents were encouraged to report the damage to Sussex Police and to the management company for replacement. As part of our ongoing foot and vehicle patrols in and around Billingshurst, we visit the area regularly and increased our visits to the area to keep a watchful eye on it.



Criminal Damage To Bus Shelter At The North End Of The Village

On our patrols we came across damage to the bus shelter at the top of Stane Street near Coombe Hill/The Alders.

The damage suggested the use of a catapult, although no projectiles were found at the scene. This damage was reported to the Parish Council for them to report to Sussex Police as the victim of this criminal damage. Our colleagues in Storrington also advised that they have experienced similar damage too.



Egg Throwing At Vehicles – Billingshurst Railway Station

After reading a post on the local social media pages about eggs being thrown at vehicles near to the railway station we liaised with Sussex Police regarding this matter. We hoped to see if they could access CCTV footage from the area and to ascertain if the eggs were purchased from a nearby store which could help to identify the possible suspects.

Unfortunately, although posted on Facebook, the egging was not reported to Sussex Police, and the therefore did not investigate the incident.
