Stay Safe As The Nights Draw In

The weather may still feel warm, and winter might seem a long way off, but now is a good time to make sure you are ready for the colder months ahead.

Taking a few simple steps now can help keep you, your family and your home safe this winter. From checking smoke alarms and electrical appliances to knowing what support is available if you need it, being prepared can make a big difference when colder weather arrives.

Below is practical advice from [Neighbourhood Watch WIDE\(N\)](#) to help you protect your home, belongings, and community.

Home Security & The "Darker Nights" Campaign

As the autumn equinox approaches and the clocks prepare to change, days grow shorter and nights lengthen — and opportunistic burglars use that extra cover of darkness to target homes that appear empty. Now is the ideal time to join our "Leave a Light On" campaign and review your home security habits:

- **Leave a Light On:** Use 24-hour segment timer switches or smart bulbs so lights turn on automatically before dusk. A lit home looks occupied and deters intruders at a glance.
- **Lock Everything, Every Time:** Get into the routine of locking all doors, windows, and gates — even when you are inside the house or just stepping out for a few minutes. Many burglaries happen through unlocked doors and windows.
- **Secure Your Perimeter:** Put away garden tools, ladders, and equipment that thieves could use to break into your home. Store them securely out of sight so they cannot be used against you.

Garden, Shed & Outbuilding Security

As you pack away summer furniture, garden gear, and leisure items for winter, don't forget to lock them down. Sheds, garages, and outbuildings are prime targets right now — burglars actively seek out high-value items such as bikes, lawnmowers, and power tools, often stored in buildings with flimsy or outdated locks.

Take these simple defensive steps:

- Upgrade to heavy-duty, hardened-steel padlocks for all outbuilding doors.
- Install low-cost, battery-powered shed alarms — they are loud, affordable, and highly effective at scaring intruders away.
- Plant thorny shrubs along fences and boundaries to make climbing and unobserved access far more difficult.
- Mark valuable items with your postcode and register them on recognised property databases like [Immobalise](#) to aid recovery if stolen.

Vehicle Security & Tool Theft

Darker streets and longer nights mean parked vehicles become easier targets. Help protect your car and livelihood with advice from Neighbourhood Watch WIDE(N) Vehicle Security Guidance:

- "Clear Out Your Car": Remove all bags, coats, electronics, and loose change — if nothing is visible through the windows, there is nothing to tempt a break-in.
- Trade Van Owners — Take Extra Care: Tool theft is a major national issue. Wherever possible, remove valuable tools from your vehicle overnight. If you must keep them in the van, lock them inside a secure, bolted cage.
- Register your gear: Record serial numbers and register all tools, equipment, and valuables on recognised tracking databases like [Immobalise](#) — property that is marked and registered is far more likely to be recovered and returned to you.

Early Preparation for Halloween & Bonfire Night — Anti-Social Behaviour (ASB) Warning

While these celebrations fall later in October and November, late September is when preparations begin and anti-social behaviour typically starts to rise. Now is the time to get ahead:

- Secure your bins: Bring wheelie bins indoors or lock them away securely — they are frequently targeted for arson around Bonfire Night.
- Report concerns early: If you see suspicious activity, groups gathering fireworks, or early signs of ASB in your neighbourhood, report it early using your local police's online reporting tools. Early reports help prevent issues from escalating.
- Keep gardens, gateways, and boundaries lit and tidy to discourage gatherings and mischief-making.

Introducing the Bolton Hate Crime Action Plan (2026–2029)

Bolton Council, Bolton CVS alongside Greater Manchester Police and local partners, such as Bolton Neighbourhood Watch, has launched the **Bolton Hate Crime Action Plan 2026–2029** (*attached to the bottom of this pdf copy*) to reaffirm a zero-tolerance stance on hatred and build a safer, more inclusive borough. Under the slogan "**No Place for Hate**," the strategy outlines a coordinated approach to tackling hostility and supporting victims across the community.

Key Focus Areas & Strategic Priorities

Aligned with the broader Greater Manchester Hate Crime Plan, the strategy focuses on six core priorities:

- **Raising Awareness:** Delivering unified public campaigns (such as "*Too Great for Hate*"), holding briefings, and utilizing high-footfall channels to clarify what constitutes a hate crime and how to report it.
- **Improving Victim Support:** Embedding trauma-informed responses across support pathways, working with providers like Catch22, and tailoring assistance to meet individual needs, including neurodiversity.

- **Increasing Reporting Confidence:** Expanding and promoting local reporting routes, which currently feature over 100 Hate Crime Ambassadors and 15 Third-Party Reporting Centres across Bolton.
- **Proactive Prevention:** Monitoring local sentiment, using neighbourhood hotspot mapping to address emerging tensions early, and enhancing safety across public transport and the nighttime economy.
- **Education & Digital Safety:** Partnering with youth groups, schools, and colleges to co-design educational programs, expanding Active Bystander training, and tackling online hostility.
- **Community Cohesion:** Working directly with voluntary, faith, and community organizations (such as Bolton CVS and the Bolton Faith Network) to support targeted groups, bridge cultural divides, and build resilience.

Addressing Underreported Hostility The plan responds directly to local data showing that race remains the most targeted characteristic, while addressing severe underreporting among vulnerable groups—including Muslim residents, disabled individuals, transgender people, and youth. Through stronger partner collaboration, accessible reporting in multiple languages, and oversight from the Independent Advisory Group (IAG), the plan aims to ensure every victim is believed, protected, and supported.

Anyone can be a victim of hate crime

How Hate Crimes Work

- **Perception matters:** A hate crime is any criminal offence felt or perceived to be caused by hostility or prejudice.
- **No membership needed:** You do not have to belong to a specific minority or targeted group to be a victim.
- **Mistaken identity:** If an attacker believes you have a certain protected characteristic—even if they are wrong—it still counts as a hate crime.
- **Example:** A person who is straight can be a victim of a hate crime if an attacker targets them while using a homophobic slur.

The Nine Protected Characteristics

There are nine characteristics protected by the Equality Act 2010 in Great Britain:

- **Age:** Protection applies to people of all ages, whether young or old.
- **Disability:** A physical or mental impairment with a long-term, substantial effect on daily life.
- **Gender reassignment:** The process of transitioning from one gender to another.
- **Marriage and civil partnership:** Being legally married or in a civil partnership.
- **Pregnancy and maternity:** Being pregnant or on maternity leave (including breastfeeding).
- **Race:** Includes colour, nationality, ethnic, or national origins.
- **Religion or belief:** Any religious, philosophical, or lack of belief.
- **Sex:** Being male or female.
- **Sexual orientation:** Attraction to the same sex, opposite sex, or both.

Where You Are Protected

The law stops unfair treatment in everyday situations:

- At work and during recruitment
- In education and schools
- As a consumer using public or private services
- When buying, renting, or managing property

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Foreword

Bolton is a proud, diverse, and welcoming borough, home to communities who contribute richly to our culture, economy, and shared identity. Our strength lies in our willingness to stand together, support one another, and celebrate the differences that make Bolton unique. Yet we recognise that hate crime continues to harm individuals, families, and neighbourhoods. Some groups remain particularly vulnerable, including children and young people, disabled residents, transgender people, and members of our Muslim communities who continue to experience under reported incidents of anti Muslim hate. Addressing this honestly is essential if we are to build a safer and more inclusive Bolton for everyone.

This Hate Crime Action Plan sets out our shared commitment - across Bolton Council, Greater Manchester Police, the Community Safety Partnership, housing providers, schools, voluntary and faith organisations, health services and community groups - to prevent hate in all its forms, improve confidence to report, and ensure victims receive the support they deserve. Through strengthened partnerships with schools, colleges, youth services and families, we will ensure that children and young people are heard, protected, and empowered.

Housing providers and landlords also play a vital role in identifying hate incidents early within neighbourhoods. Their involvement in reporting, safeguarding and hotspot monitoring is an essential part of our strategic approach. Improved neighbourhood hotspot mapping will help us identify emerging tensions more quickly and target resources where they are needed most.

We are committed to ensuring that information, reporting routes and services are accessible to everyone, including residents whose first language is not English. Nobody should be left without a voice or be excluded from support.

The Independent Advisory Group (IAG) will continue to provide essential insight, challenge and accountability. As a community led forum, the IAG brings lived experience and ensures this plan remains grounded in the realities faced by our diverse communities.

We know that hate crime is still significantly under reported - particularly anti Muslim hatred, disability hate crime, and hate targeting transgender residents. Children and young people, often experience hate but do not always feel able to report it. This plan therefore focuses on building trust, widening reporting routes, developing youth centred trauma informed approaches, and ensuring community based organisations are empowered to support victims.

Together, as partners and as a community, we stand firmly with victims. Hate crime has no place in Bolton. Through this plan, we reaffirm our determination to reject hate, support those affected, and build stronger, safer, more cohesive communities where everyone who lives, works or studies here feels safe, valued and welcome.

Introduction

Bolton is proud of its diversity and is committed to ensuring that every resident feels safe, respected and able to thrive. This Action Plan sets out Bolton's clear, zero tolerance approach to hate crime in all its forms, recognising the serious harm it causes to individuals, families and communities. Through strong partnership working, early intervention and robust enforcement, we will prevent hate crime wherever possible and ensure that victims are believed, supported and empowered to access the help and justice they need. By listening to communities, valuing difference and challenging prejudice, Bolton reaffirms its ambition to remain an inclusive borough where diversity is celebrated and hatred has no place

What we Mean by “Hate Crime”

Hate crime is any criminal offence perceived by the victim, or by any other person, to be motivated by hostility or prejudice based on:

- race or perceived race;
- religion or perceived religion;
- sexual orientation or perceived sexual orientation;
- disability or perceived disability;
- transgender identity or perceived transgender identity.

In Greater Manchester, alternative subculture is also monitored as a hate strand.

Our Partnership with the Greater Manchester Hate Crime Plan

The Greater Manchester Hate Crime Plan 2024–2028 was developed through a collaborative partnership involving statutory agencies, local authorities, and organisations across the voluntary, community, faith and social enterprise (VCFSE) sector. Key partners included Greater Manchester Police, all ten Greater Manchester local councils, the Crown Prosecution Service, Transport for Greater Manchester (TfGM), NHS Greater Manchester, Greater Manchester Fire and Rescue Service, and the Greater Manchester Combined Authority.

Bolton Council played a direct role in shaping the plan, building on its ongoing commitment since 2020 to actively participate in Greater Manchester's hate crime governance and delivery structures. This involvement ensures that Bolton's local intelligence, community insight and examples of good practice are fully reflected in the strategic approach.

The plan was launched in October 2024, and its significance became even more apparent following the social unrest and rising societal tensions during the summer of that year. Recent incidents, including the attack at Crumpsall Synagogue and the Bondi Beach attack in Australia, have further heightened anxieties and concerns within communities.

On 14 October 2025, during National Hate Crime Awareness Week, professionals from a range of sectors gathered at the Toughsheet Community Stadium for a multi-agency hate crime conference. The event focused on the impact of hate crime, the available routes for reporting incidents, and ways to strengthen support for victims

Achieving the Vision in Bolton

Bolton, in line with the wider Greater Manchester approach, has a zero-tolerance stance on hate crime. We work closely with partners across the borough to prevent and tackle all forms of hate, ensuring that our communities are safer, stronger, and more inclusive for everyone. Our local actions are fully aligned with the six priorities of the Greater Manchester Hate Crime Plan, ensuring consistency and shared ambition across the region.

Linking to Bolton's 2040 Vision

The bolton2040-borough-plan sets a 'long term' direction focused on prevention, investment and sustainable growth. Mission Five - Safe and Protected - focuses on building confident and cohesive communities, where people feel secure, supported, and listened to. This mission places community cohesion and collective voice at its heart, making it central to Bolton's approach to tackling hate crime. Long term direction focused on prevention, investment and sustainable growth.



Our hate crime work directly contributes to achieving this ambition. By strengthening community safety, promoting cohesion, and encouraging reporting, we help create the conditions outlined in the 2040 Vision. Through partnership working and proactive prevention efforts, Bolton is committed to creating a borough where everyone feels protected, valued, and empowered to thrive.

Bolton Residents

Bolton has population of 302,383. This breaks down as follows:

- 73,832 are aged 0-17,
- 176,783 are aged 18-64
- 51,768 are aged over 65

Bolton has a higher proportion of young people (under eighteen) than England and slightly higher than Greater Manchester (Bolton 24%; GM 23%; England 21%). We have a lower proportion of people aged 65+ than England but slightly more than Greater Manchester (Bolton 17%; GM 16%; England 19%).

Bolton is a place of great diversity as is reflected by the demographics below that are of relevance to hate crime:

- 94,500 ethnic minorities (94,464)
- 5,700 LGBT+ community
- 1,469 residents have a different sex from the one registered at birth
- 54,429 have a disability

The role of the Community Safety Partnership
The delivery of this strategic ambition is driven locally through the Bolton Community Safety Partnership (CSP) priorities, which provide the operational framework that turns the 2040 Vision into practice.

These priorities are:

1. Keep People Safe
2. Reducing Harm and Offending
3. Strengthening Communities and Place

Work to tackle hate crime contributes directly to all three of these priorities. It supports the protection of vulnerable residents, reduces the risk of further harm or escalation, and strengthens community confidence, resilience, and cohesion.

Connecting Strategy To Delivery

Together, the GM plan, the 2040 Vision, and the CSP priorities create a coherent framework. Bolton's hate crime work is strategically aligned, operationally grounded, and focused on meaningful impact - helping to build a borough where everyone feels safe, respected, and able to thrive.

Governance and Oversight

Bolton Council leads and coordinates this plan. Governance will sit with the Belonging in Bolton Steering Group a subgroup of the Community Safety Partnership (CSP), which will oversee the development, delivery and ongoing monitoring of our local implementation of the GM Plan. The Steering Group will foster effective partnerships, build on strong foundations, evaluate outcomes, including impact assessments and report regularly to the CSP and GM Hate Crime Leads meetings. This plan reflects the 20 GM actions (below) and will be refreshed in line with the GM Plan review in 2028.

Bolton's Progress

Bolton's plan is comprehensive and ensures the local implementation of each of the Greater Manchester Hate Crime Plan priorities and actions. It builds on the significant work already undertaken locally, including initiatives supported through the Hate Crime grant, extensive community training, and the development of local capacity.

This work has resulted in a strong infrastructure across the borough, including a network of more than 100 Hate Crime Ambassadors and 15 Third party Hate Crime Reporting Centres established as part of the Hate Crime Centre Refresh. For further information: Hate crime – Bolton Council

The plan has been informed by best practice shared through the following:

- Greater Manchester Hate Crime Leads meetings
- Police led Hate Crime Working Group meetings
- Greater Manchester resident consultation data
- Feedback from Third Party Reporting Centre and Ambassador training sessions
- Learning from the multi agency Hate Crime Conference held at the Toughsheet Community Stadium on 14 October 2025.

The interventions set out within the plan are designed to support multiple priorities. However, the Hate Crime Steering Group may, where necessary, rationalise or refine actions, agree amendments, and provide a clear mandate to the Council's Hate Crime lead to coordinate the further development and delivery of interventions.

The Hate Crime Picture

Across Greater Manchester, 11,112 hate crimes were recorded between December 2024 and November 2025, with clear seasonal variation: levels were lowest in December 2024 (705) and peaked in August 2025 (1,128). Bolton broadly follows this pattern but shows sharper month-to-month to month swings than the GMP average. Race related hate crimes are the most reported followed by disability, sexual orientation, religion, and transgender related hate crimes.

Bolton's Position

- 974 hate crimes (December 2024 to November 2025)
- The share of GMP total is 8.77%
- Ranked fourth highest out of 12 GMP areas (note Manchester is split into 3 areas)
- The peak month was July 2025 (118)
- The lowest month was December 2024 (46)

Bolton's summer months (June to August) account for 31.8% of its annual hate crime - slightly higher than the GMP-wide summer share (29.6%). This indicates a stronger seasonal uplift locally.

In terms of comparison with other areas:

- The highest totals are:
 - o Manchester Central (1,654)
 - o Manchester North (1,140)
 - o Salford (1,114)
- Bolton sits just below these, ahead of Oldham, Rochdale and all other districts.
- Combined, the three Manchester divisions account for 32.55% of all GMP hate crime.

In terms of the monthly position, Bolton typically ranks fourth or fifth each month. It has a more volatile pattern than the force average, with large percentage changes around the spring and summer transition periods.

Improving Support for Victims

Bolton is committed to ensuring that victims are never left to face hate crime alone, and that everyone feels safe, supported, and listened to when reporting incidents. A key part of tackling hate crime is making sure it is reported whenever and wherever it occurs. Hate crime is often underreported, which makes addressing it far more challenging. For example, Muslim communities continue to feedback that incidences of anti Muslim hate underreported. Trauma Informed Practice

We are committed to ensuring that all contact with victims and witnesses of hate incidents and hate crimes is grounded in trauma informed practice. We recognise that experiences of hate can cause profound and lasting harm, impacting emotional wellbeing, trust in services and willingness to engage. All partners are therefore expected to respond in ways that prioritise safety, dignity, choice and empowerment, and that avoid re-traumatisation. By embedding trauma informed principles across reporting, investigation, support and follow up, we will ensure that people are listened to, believed and supported at every stage of their journey, regardless of whether they choose to formally report an offence.

Implementation and Actions

The following pages outline how Bolton will implement each of the 20 actions identified to address the six priorities of the Greater Manchester Hate Crime Plan. Belonging in Bolton Steering Group is expected to further refine the interventions, adjust timescales where necessary, and seek opportunities to involve additional partners. The actions include contributions from both Greater Manchester-wide service providers and local services.
