What is a special constable?

Special constables are volunteer police officers, sometimes known as specials. They take part in frontline police work and wear the same uniform, carry the same equipment and hold the same power of arrest as regular police officers.

How many hours do I need to volunteer?

If you are committed to taking on this challenging but rewarding role, you will need to complete a minimum of 16 hours policing each month. You can volunteer at times which fit around your life and commitments – we can make your shifts work for you.



What are the benefits?

- the ability to remain calm under pressure
- decision making
