### **Our Current Beat Priorities:**

### 1) & Op PedalFast – Anti-Social Behaviour (ASB) involving E-Scooters and E-Bikes

Concerns have been raised about the misuse of e-scooters and e-bikes in public spaces, particularly in parks and open areas.

- We will increase visible patrols in hotspot areas to deter dangerous riding and anti-social behaviour.
- We will engage with local communities and partners to address concerns and promote responsible
  use.
- We will share clear guidance on the legal use of e-scooters and e-bikes and encourage reporting of misuse.

### 2) Car Cruising activity in and around Ashby Town Centre

This remains a concern for residents and visitors, with ongoing reports of cars racing and gathering in car parks.

- We will continue enforcement against those driving dangerously or causing ASB.
- We will work with landowners to reduce opportunities for gatherings through crime prevention measures.
- We will educate young drivers about the risks and consequences of irresponsible driving.

### 3) Road Safety in and around Packington

Improving road safety in Packington and nearby villages is a key priority.

- We will increase patrols to monitor speeding and dangerous driving, especially in areas highlighted by residents.
- We will engage with the community to identify specific concerns and target our efforts effectively.
- We will support traffic calming initiatives and promote safe driving through education and enforcement.

### 🛎 E-Scooter & E-Bike Operation Pedalfast – Ashby & Coalville 🛎

On the 30th of October, officers carried out a pre-planned operation targeting the illegal and unsafe use of e-scooters and e-bikes across Ashby and Coalville, in line with our current beat priorities and in response to growing concerns from the community.

We've received numerous reports about the misuse of these vehicles—riders travelling at high speeds, weaving through traffic, riding on pavements, and operating without insurance or road legality. These behaviours not only break the law but also put pedestrians, drivers, and the riders themselves at serious risk.

As part of our new zero-tolerance approach, offending riders will no longer receive a warning. If a rider is found using an illegal e-scooter or e-bike, the vehicle will be seized immediately. This decision reflects the seriousness of the issue and our commitment to keeping our streets safe.

During the operation, officers seized several escooters. Officers also engaged with the public to raise awareness about the legal requirements for using escooters and e-bikes. We also provided advice on how to stay safe and compliant with the law.

We're grateful to the community for continuing to share concerns and suggestions. Your input helps us focus our efforts where they're needed most. Further operations are planned, and we'll continue working with residents to identify problem areas.

### Speeding Operation – Beats 46 & 47

On the 21st of October, officers Will (6443), Connor (6574), and Mary (6633) from Ashby Beat (Beat 46), along with Maddie (6686) from Forest Beat (Beat 47), carried out a targeted speeding operation in response to concerns raised by residents.

- Moira Road, Shellbrook (30mph limit)
- 148 vehicles checked
- 9 drivers were found exceeding the limit:
- 2x at 35mph
- 3x at 36mph
- 1x at 37mph
- 3x at 38mph
- Acresford Road, Donisthorpe (30mph limit)
- 102 vehicles checked
- 11 drivers caught speeding:
- 1x at 37mph
- 3x at 40mph
- 2x at 41mph
- 2x at 43mph
- 1x at 45mph
- 1x at 47mph
- 1x at a shocking 53mph

All offending drivers have been dealt with accordingly.

We understand how deeply speeding affects the safety and peace of our community. It's not just about breaking the law—it's about putting lives at risk. These checks are carried out because you've told us where the problems are, and we're listening.

Thank you to everyone who has spoken with us, shared concerns, and suggested locations for future operations. We're continuing to engage with residents to identify more areas where road safety can be improved.

Please help us keep our roads safe. Slow down, stick to the limits, and protect those around you.

Your voice matters, and together we can make our streets safer for everyone.



### 🛎 Community Patrols & Road Safety – Packington, Normanton-le-Heath & Ravenstone 🛎

Officers have been conducting regular patrols in Packington, Normanton-le-Heath, and Ravenstone, responding to ongoing concerns raised by residents around road safety and speeding.

We've heard your worries loud and clear- speeding continues to be a serious issue across all three areas, and we're committed to tackling it head-on. As part of our efforts, we're currently working to schedule another targeted speed operation aimed at addressing these concerns and making our roads safer for everyone.

These patrols aren't just about enforcement—they're about visibility, reassurance, and listening. Officers have been engaging with residents, gathering feedback, and identifying key hotspots where speeding is most prevalent.

Speeding affects everyone—from families walking to school, to cyclists, and other drivers. It's not just a nuisance; it's a danger. We're determined to take action and will continue working closely with the community to ensure your voices shape our priorities.

With Halloween and Bonfire Night coming up, we also had a chat about staying safe, sticking with trusted adults, and enjoying the festivities responsibly. It was great to see how engaged and thoughtful the children were during these conversations.
