Tackling ASB this Summer

To help ensure everyone can enjoy the Summer safely, and without fear of anti-social behaviour (ASB), we're taking extra steps over the coming months across areas of Eastbourne.



PCSO Hadlow for Hampden Park said "This summer I am going to be focusing particular attention on hotspot areas of anti-social behaviour that have been reported to me by residents and businesses in the area."

"In partnership with Friends of Hampden Park, and through conversations with local youngsters in the area, I am looking at ways of improving the Skate Park to make it a more welcoming place for kids of all ages to use over the holiday".

"In partnership with the Council, we are tackling anti-social behaviour, such as the lighting of fires, through a greater presence in the park".

"I have also been made aware to anti-social behaviour and drug dealing in the Station carpark and I will be increasing the evening patrols there, as well as youth related ASB around Eastbourne Sports Park, all of which I will be focussing on this Summer".


Weekend hot weather advice

If you get into trouble in the water: Float to Live



- * Tilt your head back, with your ears submerged
- * Relax and try to breathe normally
- * Move your hands and feet to help you stay afloat
- * It's fine if your legs sink, we all float differently

In an emergency, call 999 and ask for the Coastguard.

Please swim between the red and yellow flags at a Lifeguarded beach and leave inflatables at home—offshore winds can whisk them away before you know it!

Everyone has the right to feel safe on a night out.



Your Eastbourne Night Safety Marshals (NSM), continue to work alongside Police and local partners to help keep people safe.

Working each Friday and Saturday night between 8pm and 4am, the NSM are made up of teams of individuals who have been trained in identifying and helping vulnerable people, and are there to help provide an extra level of support on top of the extensive work already being done by Sussex Police and partner agencies to keep people safe during the night-time economy.

The marshals also complement the work of the Eastbourne Street Pastors, and schemes such as Best Bar None, bringing businesses together to work together to promote the town in a positive light.

If you or someone you know are a victim of crime or need assistance on a night out, speak to a police officer, bar staff, Street Pastor or Night Safety Marshal.
