Alcester Police SNTs. Latest Weekly Report. Sunday 28th December 2025

Based at Alcester Police Station, The Safer Neighbourhood team's primary roles are around crime prevention, problem solving both long standing or emerging issues of community concern and community engagement. We are supported at Alcester by colleagues from Patrol teams whose role is to respond to incidents and investigate crimes that occur in the area 24/7. The SNT is supervised by Inspector Jake Kibblewhite who leads on Neighbourhood Policing for Stratford District and Sgt Ebbs who also oversees neighbourhood Policing in the Shipston on Stour area. The Alcester SNT currently consists of 2 Police officers and 5 Police Community Support Officers, and our contact details are shown above.

No excuse for drink or drug driving this Christmas.

We are cracking down on drink and drug driving this festive season to target those who put innocent lives at risk on our roads.

Every driver involved in a collision will face a roadside breath test or drug wipe. Our officers have already increased their patrols and drivers may find themselves being directed into a traffic check point to be tested for drink and drugs and to deal with any traffic offences and vehicle defects.

Our message to drivers is simple - don't drive if you've been drinking or taking drugs. If you do, you are risking your licence and your future.

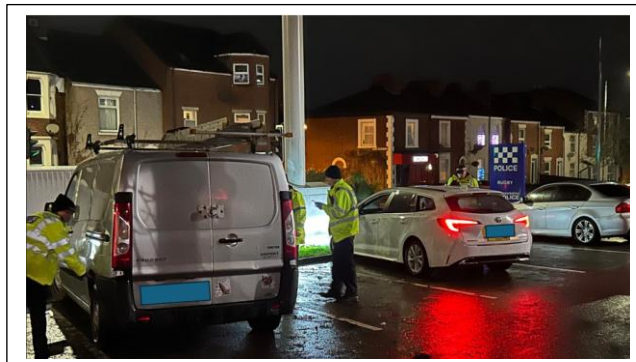
We're asking the public and CCTV operators to report suspected offenders. Call 101, or 999 in an emergency. To stay anonymous, contact Crimestoppers on 0800 555 111 or online.

Inspector Wayne Boulton said "We're using intelligence to target hotspots and keep roads safe. Enforcement is vital, but our priority is education – changing behaviour so drivers make the right choice."

"Many of the drivers we have stopped at check points passed a breath test and were supportive of the operation. We thank you all for driving safely and legally."

Safer Warwickshire Partnership Board – A year of action to keep communities safe.

Over the past 12 months, the Safer Warwickshire Partnership Board has brought together Warwickshire County Council, the Office of the Police and Crime Commissioner, Warwickshire Police, district and borough councils, and a wide range of local agencies and community groups to make the county a safer place for everyone.

Through this collaborative approach, the partnership has delivered targeted projects to reduce anti-social behaviour, protect vulnerable residents, and promote crime prevention through education and engagement. These efforts have included:

- Community engagement and awareness – hosting events and workshops to share practical advice on personal safety, home security, and crime prevention.
- Support for those most at risk – providing tailored assistance and safeguarding measures to help vulnerable residents feel safe and supported.
- Focused interventions in hotspot areas – working with local partners to create safer public spaces and tackle persistent issues.
- Education and prevention – collaborating with schools and youth groups to promote positive behaviours and prevent crime before it happens.

Alongside these activities, the partnership has championed countywide campaigns to tackle issues such as anti-social behaviour, retail crime, domestic abuse, sexual violence, and child exploitation.

These initiatives have raised awareness, encouraged reporting, and strengthened community resilience.

Ben Smith, Assistant Chief Constable for Warwickshire Police, said: "Through combining the resources and expertise of partners, we're seeing real improvements in our ability to reduce the antisocial behaviour that affects our communities and to improve safety for residents.

"We're grateful for the continued input of members of the public too, giving us vital insight on community concerns and priorities so that we know where we need to target our collective efforts."

Research

Our research confirms that nearly a fifth of the public have known about a crime but chose not to talk to the police (according to insights drawn from various research projects commissioned by Crimestoppers).

Some of the reasons for people not speaking out include:

- I do not want to talk to the police.
- I need to report someone I know.
- I am worried that others will know if I speak out.
- I am not sure if what I know will help.
- I do not want to get involved with courts.
