WOODINGDEAN Patrols

Patrols have been completed across various areas of WOODINGDEAN. These patrols are directed with information/ intelligence we receive.

The central park has been patrolled regularly, with foot patrols near and around the playground.

I encourage those within information around a particular concern, to please make a report. As this could help me patrol more particular areas of concern. This can be done via 101 or 999 in an emergency.

Same as last month's however this month focuses in on how to protect yourself against phone theft.

These safety measures can include having find my enabled for (iPhones) and SmartThings Find for (android).

By having this enabled, you can see an accurate location of where your mobile phone is. In the event, your phone did ever get stolen this could be a vital piece of information that can help police locate your phone.

Other measures can include, being aware of your surroundings.

- If you need to call or use your phone on the street, look out for anyone on a bike or a moped near you. Look up, look out
- Make it quick so you don't become distracted
- Don't text while you're walking you won't notice what's going on around you
- If that's not possible, stand away from the roadside, close to a building or wall, so no one can come up behind you
- Going hands-free can prevent a thief from snatching your phone out of your hand

Hopefully these pieces of advice will help in keeping you safer.
