


BEAT PRIORITIES

<u>Burglary:</u> Beat officers to put up footprint on ALL residential burglaries and ensure safeguarding for the occupants and that support is in place. Offer alarms where necessary and victim support where needed. Beat officers to support with CCTV/Statement enquiries where demand allows and ensure safeguarding reports are completed to those who need it.

Road Safety, Drug Dealing: As a team we are planning on increasing the road safety operations such as Belgrave Road. Working with partner agencies, and we are working on this to aid education around road safety and the impacts RTC's have on everyone involved. We will be looking at enforcing on illegal E-Bikes and E-Scooters.

<u>Street Drinking and General ASB:</u> Officers conducting active high visibility patrols within known hotspots areas. Robustly gathering details where possible of those involved in ASB. Repeat offenders will be dealt with via the incremental approach. Beat Team working with local council and CAP partners to tackle street drinking within the area. Drug dealing/cuckooing has become apparent on the area and officers remain vigilant.

<u>ATM distraction Thefts:</u> Increase visible and covert patrols around high-risk ATMs, especially during early morning hours when thefts often occur.

And as we come to the end of 2025. It's been a pleasure to see many of you out at events including my monthly patrols and I'd welcome you to come say hello to one of the team or myself and let us know what you think!

Having now been fortunate enough to lead the neighbourhood team across East Leicester for nearly two years it has now started to sink in just how brilliant our local communities are in terms of their desire to make Leicester a better place and support their families, businesses and communities.

I have been fortunate enough to attend several brilliant events across the year including Remembrance Sunday, Ganesh, Eid, Vaisakhi and Diwali to name but a few to see our communities celebrate using their own blend of colour, music and dance.

Locally we have had some challenges in relation to some of the festivities including the Anti-Social use of fireworks and it is through striving to professionalise the process of organising street parties, processions and celebrations we have had to for the first time look to utilise criminal powers to deal with repeat offenders.

It is through the buy in of the communities and a communal understanding that legislation is there to support celebrating our cultures and communities, but with some much needed bureaucracy involved to ensure all are kept safe, that we are now in a good position going forward.

In stark contrast to the celebrations held 2025 has had some truly tragic incidents with terrorist attacks striking at the heart of our communities. Thank you to those who have given Leicestershire Police so very much support, from those within our key individual networks and community leaders, through to the members of our local and strategic independent advisory groups who have helped give us a constructive review of what we do and a well needed perspective on how to improve.
