Speed enforcement

Following community concerns surrounding speeding in key streets across the Kettering area, neighbourhood officers have carried out a series of speed enforcement activities in the following areas:

Police surgeries

Key concerns currently being raised at these surgeries are around e-scooters, drug consumption and dealing. E-scooter patrols have been conducted in Ise, and officers are asking for any information you may have that can help us tackle what is important to you in your community.

E-scooters

Members of the public are once again being urged to make themselves aware of the rules on using privately-owned electric scooters after an increase in their use across Northamptonshire since the start of the New Year. E-scooters are classified as Personal Light Electric Vehicles, which means they are treated as motor vehicles and therefore subject to all the same legal requirements such as insurance and licensing. However, privately owned e-scooters cannot currently meet the legal criteria and therefore remain illegal to use on roads or ridden on pavements, in parks or in other public areas, and owners risk prosecution if caught flouting the laws.

Drink and drug driving campaign

On December 1 2025, the annual month-long winter drink and drug driving campaign launched. Alongside Operation Limit, the campaign aims to deliver a clear message on the consequences of driving while under the influence of alcohol and drugs across social media channels. In addition to the online campaign, the Roads Policing and Safer Roads Teams also carried out extra patrols throughout December and into the New Year, with the support of colleagues from Response, Neighbourhood Policing, and the Special Constabulary. Drink and drug driving is one of the main contributors in collisions and is one of the fatal five driving offences, alongside careless driving, not wearing a seat belt, excessive speed, and using a mobile phone whilst behind the wheel. It does matter

The 'It Does Matter' campaign launched on November 25 last year, aimed at raising awareness of, and encouraging victims, to report non-contact sexual offences, which have previously been overlooked as forms of violence against women and girls (VAWG). Over the period, Northamptonshire Police used Live Facial Recognition (LFR) cameras for the first time in three town centres to help proactively target those at risk of committing offences against women and girls, resulting in six arrests and checks on further individuals. Alongside the campaign, the proactive policing initiative Operation Kayak, was also promoted, working closely with pubs and clubs, street pastors, Northampton Guardians, and volunteers who work on the Safer Nights Out Van (SNO van), to ensure the vulnerable are looked after and safeguarded. Tackling violence against women and girls is a priority for Northamptonshire Police and this awareness raising campaign is part of wider work to protect and safeguard those at risk of abuse and sexual assault. Tackling knife crime

During the Sceptre week of action in November 2025, departments from across Northamptonshire Police came together to tackle and highlight the issues of knife crime, visiting schools, youth groups and holding knife amnesties as part of a national week of action. During the week, 198 knives were recovered from amnesty bins/handed in, and 37 weapons sweeps were conducted, finding 16 weapons. [Read more here.](#)
