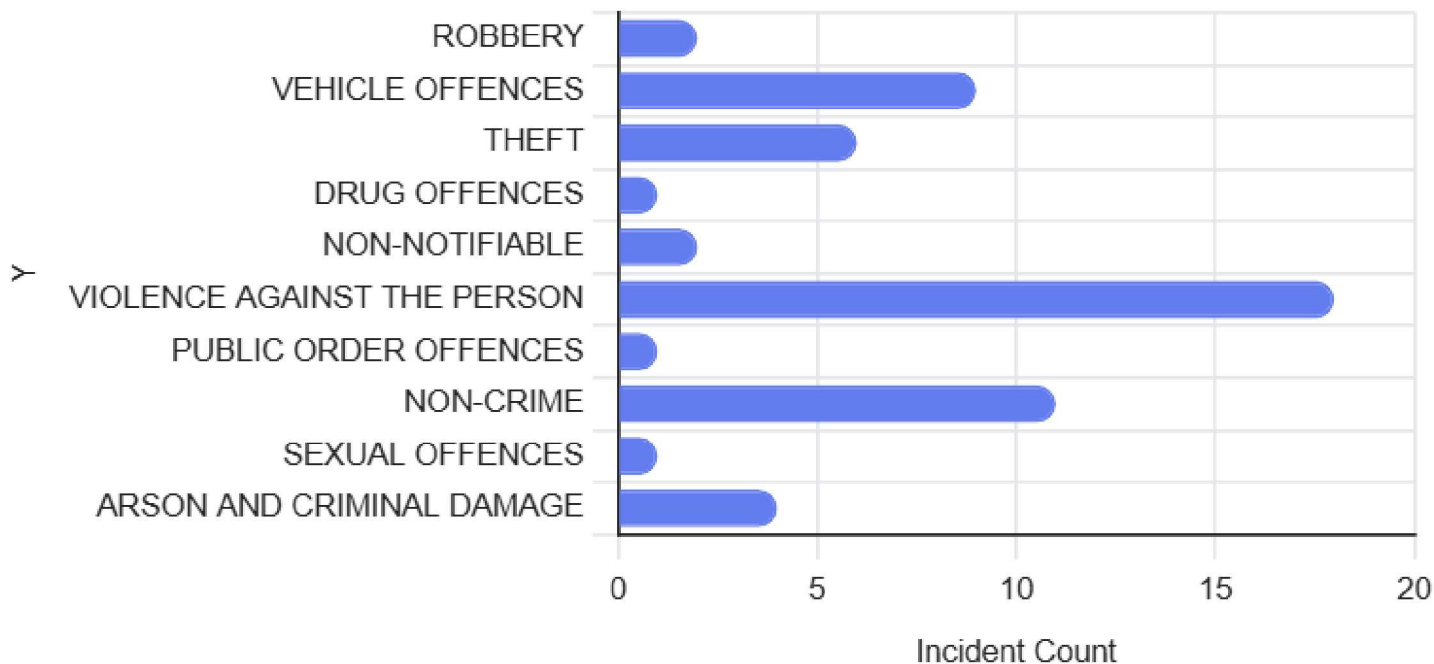


June Crime Incidents



June Crime Summary

Total incidents recorded: 55

Highest Crime Types

Violence Against the Person: 18 incidents (32.7%)

Non-Crime: 11 incidents (20.0%)

Vehicle Offences: 9 incidents (16.4%)

Theft: 6 incidents (10.9%)

Lower Volume Categories

Arson and Criminal Damage: 4 incidents

Robbery: 2 incidents

Non-Notifiable: 2 incidents

Drug Offences: 1 incident

Public Order Offences: 1 incident

Sexual Offences: 1 incident

Key Points

Violence Against the Person was the most common category, accounting for nearly one-third of all incidents.

Non-Crime reports formed a significant proportion of demand, with 11 recorded incidents.

Vehicle Offences and Theft remain notable crime trends, together representing 15 incidents.

Reports of Drug Offences, Public Order Offences, and Sexual Offences were low, with one incident each.

Overall, incidents involving violence, vehicle crime, and theft accounted for 33 of the 55 incidents (60%), making them the primary areas of concern for June.

THEFT vs ROBBERY

Know the Difference. Know the Law.

THEFT	ROBBERY	
<p>Theft is taking someone else's property without their permission and without using force or threat.</p>  <p>EXAMPLE: Picking a wallet from a pocket, stealing a phone from a table, or shoplifting from a store.</p>	<p>Robbery is taking someone else's property by using force, violence, or threat of force.</p>  <p>EXAMPLE: Using a weapon, threatening someone, or using force to take money, a phone, or any property.</p>	
KEY DIFFERENCES		
 USE OF FORCE No force or threat is used.	VS	 USE OF FORCE Force, violence, or threat of force is used.
 VICTIM'S AWARENESS Victim is usually unaware during the act.	VS	 VICTIM'S AWARENESS Victim is aware and often confronted.
 NATURE OF THE ACT Usually done in secret and without confrontation.	VS	 NATURE OF THE ACT Usually done openly and may involve confrontation.
 LEGAL CONSEQUENCE Generally a less severe offense.	VS	 LEGAL CONSEQUENCE Generally a more serious offense with harsher punishments.

UNDERSTANDING NON-CRIME REPORTS

Although no criminal offence has taken place, the police are often contacted for other important reasons.

Examples of non-crime incidents include:

-  Neighbour disputes
-  Missing person reports
-  Welfare checks

-  Mental health concerns
-  Suspicious circumstances

Dealing with these incidents helps to keep the public safe and assist vulnerable people who may be at risk.

ROBBERY

Three robbery offences were recorded during June, with offenders targeting mobile phones.

Crime Prevention Advice

- ✓ Keep phones out of sight when not in use
- ✓ Stay alert near bus stops and transport hubs
- ✓ Avoid walking while distracted by your phone
- ✓ Consider enabling phone tracking and security features

Parcel Theft

A parcel left outside a property on **The Fairway** was stolen before the resident could collect it.





Phone Theft

A mobile phone was snatched from a victim's hand whilst walking along **The Fairway**.

Wheelie Bin Theft

A wheelie bin was stolen from a property on **Hedge Lane**.

Key Message


Common Assault continues to be the most reported violence-related offence within the ward. Domestic Abuse remains a priority area, and officers continue to support victims and investigate reported incidents.

CRIMINAL DAMAGE

Four incidents of criminal damage were reported including:

 Damage linked to neighbour disputes
