#YouSaid - What matters to you

Below are our beat priorities -

Priority -

Dealing with the production of class B drugs on the area, in addition to tackling the use and supply of both class A and B drugs in areas where this affects the local community.

We did -

In November we have worked hard to develop intelligence connected to the production of class B drugs. Enforcement will follow. We have conducted numerous stop searches in the area of Glenfield Road East with suspected class B drugs recovered. We are working with partners and local charities to disrupt an apparent influx of synthetic cannabis on the beat, particularly in the Hinckley Road, Kate Street and Tudor Road areas. We have also supported the council at court to secure full re-possession of a problem flat at Frederick Jackson house, Noble Street, ending years of misery for local residents.

Priority -

Dealing with vehicle issues on the beat, to include parking issues, speeding, and anti-social behaviour, in addition to the problem of unattended vehicles being broken into.

We did

In November we have taken action against stationary vehicles for document offences where possible. PCSOs have been granted additional powers to issue tickets in a variety of circumstances. Funded patrols targeting those who would steal from stationary vehicles continue, and this has resulted in a reduction in theft from motor vehicle and burglary offences. A proactive operation relating to drug use and robberies in open spaces is scheduled for December.

Priority -

Targeting those on the ward who commit anti-social behaviour, particularly where this is connected to drinking in public. This includes in open spaces such as The Rally, Glenfield Road East and Hinckley Road near the junction with Kirby Road.

We did:

During November we dealt with 7 youths suspected of being involved with ASB connected to underage drinking on the beat. We have engaged with all parents and the relevant schools to bring this issue to a close. We have conducted a number of stop checks on Glenfield Road East connected to an anti-social problem management plan, with drugs recovered and persons moved on from the area. We have identified an insecure condemned building on Glenfield Road East which was attracting persons to use as a squat/ somewhere to consume drugs or alcohol. We have cleared the location and are working with the landlord and Leicester Fire and Rescue Service to re-secure it.

What we are doing





Welcome to the November edition of the Fosse Neighbourhood Team Newsletter.

It's been another busy month for the team. As well as our general day to day work that we carry out there have been a few instances to highlight.

- At the beginning of the year the Fosse Neighbourhood Team successfully obtained a temporary closure order at Fredrick Jackson House, a supported accommodation for vulnerable adults. This was after the team's hard work in gathering information around drug use in the building and individuals being targeted. The joint work conducted was with not only the housing manager but the council and the anti-social behaviour team too. PC Phil 4493 has recently attended court which resulted in the council successfully getting back both flats, preventing both previous occupants being able to move back in and continue to use these flats for drug use & other anti-social behaviour.
- Following investigations we have visited a number of houses to speak to some youths and their parents / guardians regarding the potential exploitation from a person who is linked to drug dealing and county lines. This is something that we needed to speak to them about and warn them of the dangers around it. Parents / guardians were very much on our side too and were grateful they had been made aware. Investigations continue with this and support will continue.
- The beat PC's continue to carry out visits to those most vulnerable to cuckooing around West Leicester. As previously stated in other newsletters, this is something all West Leicester neighbourhood beat officers carry out, helping each other and offering the best support and dealing with any criminal activity which is disclosed or that they come across.
- There have been reports of fights around Castlemead Academy at finishing time, therefore we have patrolled near the school when given the opportunity to deter any of this behaviour.

Over the last few months we've had the pleasure of PC Abbie and PC Sam joining us on the beat, but unfortunately in December they both venture back to Beaumont Leys Police Station which is where they were based initially as response officers. They will be missed by the team, and those who have had the pleasure of forming connections with them but they won't be away for too long as they will no doubt be responding to 999 calls in the area very soon! Good luck to them both and hopefully they'll come into the station for a brew break and a catch up when they can.

Lastly it's dark and it's cold, please look after yourselves and look after each other.

This will be my last Newsletter until after Christmas going into the new year so a big Merry Christmas to all residents, and a Happy New Year too.
