

Sussex Police supports national firearms amnesty launching in February

Sussex Police is joining other forces across the country in a four-week Firearms Amnesty for five types of BRUNI-manufactured side / top-venting blank firers (TVBFs) which are now illegal to possess following testing by the National Crime Agency and policing.

The amnesty will take place between February 2 and 27, 2026, after which anyone in possession of one of the specified TVBFs could be subject to prosecution and up to 10 years' imprisonment.



During the amnesty period, those handing in a BRUNI TVBFs will not face prosecution for the illegal possession and will not have to give their details. However, the history of any live firearms handed in will be checked for evidence of its use in crime.

People can hand these blank firers in over the counter at designated police stations between these dates, while anyone unable to travel to one of these locations can call the police on 101 to request it be picked up from their home.

Anyone wishing to take part in the amnesty has been urged to use common sense when transporting their TVBF to one of the chosen stations – by placing them in a labelled bag or box and making their way straight there.

Top/Side Venting Blank Firers can be handed in at the following police stations in West Sussex:

- Chichester Police Station, Kingsham Road, Chichester, PO19 8AD (open Monday-Saturday 9am- 5pm)
- Crawley Police Station, Northgate Avenue, Crawley, RH10 8BF (open Monday-Saturday 9am- 5pm)
- Worthing Police Station, Chatsworth Road, Worthing, BN11 1LY (open Monday-Saturday 9am- 5pm)

In a bid to reduce this figure and save lives, Sussex Police has launched the new Fatal Five Unit, set up specifically to tackle the five most common causes of fatal and serious injury collisions:

- Drink and drug-driving
- Speeding
- Failing to wear a seatbelt
- Distracted driving
- Careless driving

Sussex Police are conducting a pilot project for motorcyclists, to take part in free of charge, to reduce motorcycle crashes in the future.

What does it involve:

- You'll be required to complete a survey before and after the course
- Attend DVSA Burgess Hill for a 4-hour practical riding session to address issues involving the crash
- Complete online learning modules

Are you eligible:

- Valid UK driving licence (suitable for your motorcycle)
- A legal, roadworthy motorcycle
- Appropriate protective clothing – including helmet and gloves
- Must have been involved in a motorcycle collision in the last two years

PC Steve Bucksey from the Sussex Police Road Safety Team, and leading the programme, said: "Motorcycling offers a sense of freedom and excitement, but we recognise that collisions can happen—and when they do, the difference between a minor injury and a life-changing or fatal outcome can be incredibly small.

"We're inviting motorcyclists in Sussex who have been involved in a collision to join our pilot programme. This course has been developed around the main causes of motorcycle collisions, with practical training designed to help prevent them from happening again. By taking part, you'll gain skills to keep yourself safer on the road, while helping us create a programme that could benefit riders across the country in the future."

Selsey speed checks

You said speeding was a concern in your area — we listened!

In recent weeks, officers have carried out multiple speed checks at locations across Selsey and the surrounding area, in response to community feedback. These checks are about road safety and are focused on reducing risk for everyone who uses our roads.



During one recent speed check, officers issued two Traffic Offence Reports to two drivers of vehicles that were speeding in Manor Road. One of the drivers was driving otherwise than in accordance with a licence and with no insurance, so the vehicle was seized.



We'll continue to conduct speed checks using data and local concerns to guide where and when these checks take place. Thank you to those who have shared information with us — your input helps us to respond to your concerns.

Crimestoppers

Crimestoppers is speaking up about neighbourhood crimes. Robbery, theft, and burglary harm communities and have a long-lasting impact on their victims. People not only suffer from the loss of their possessions, the invasion of privacy and violation of personal space, but some may experience emotional distress or be left with physical injuries.

Victims of crime may experience long-term adverse effects, from feelings of strong emotions to physical effects including a lack of sleep or falling ill. For some, the trauma can force them to change their ordinary daily routines, out of fear of repeat victimisation.


