What matters to you:

Priority 1: You told us that you were concerned about burglaries within the Oadby area.

What we are doing: Officers continue to conduct regular patrols of the areas where offences have occurred, these patrols are reducing the number of burglaries. We will continue to do this going forward. Where CCTV is available, this will provide valuable intelligence on times and when offences are happening and possible vehicles involved, to assist in our patrol strategy.

Priority 2: Road Safety You said: You have told us that Road Safety is a priority, this includes things like Speeding, Insurance, MOT and driving offences.

What we are doing: We have conducted vehicle speed checks at identified locations. Local officers have been targeting motorist's speeding, not wearing seatbelts, using mobile phones and drink/drug driving. Local officers have received reports of identified vehicles being driven without valid insurance, MOT and tax.

Priority 3: Anti-social Behaviour You Said: You have told us that Anti-Social behaviour causes you concern. This can be things like excessive noise, smoking drugs and more. We will be working with partners to ensure we can tackle these issues and reduce their occurrences.

What we are doing: Your local police beat team and response officers continue to patrol identified locations, as reported by yourselves with regards to anti-social behaviour and drug related incidents. Officers continue to stop check persons and vehicles who are involved in drugs. Local officers have identified vehicles which are related to criminality.

What we have done #yousaidwedid

Some of the key activities from over May includes:

- Local officers have been proactively targeting drivers involved in vehicle-related anti-social behaviour. In several cases, drivers have been issued with Section 59 notices as a deterrent.
- Work to identify individuals involved in drug dealing within the area remains ongoing. Officers are actively gathering, developing, and assessing intelligence from a range of sources, including community information and partner agencies. This intelligence-led approach allows officers to build a clearer picture of those involved, their networks, and patterns of activity.
- In partnership with Oadby and Wigston Borough Council, the neighbourhood policing team has also been addressing reports of anti-social behaviour and, in some cases, criminal activity involving local residents. Community Protection Warnings (CPW) are to be issued where appropriate to manage these issues. It should be noted that this type of enforcement and investigation can be complex and requires time to progress effectively.
- Officers from the Oadby Neighbourhood Policing Team have been working closely with children's care homes within the Oadby area. This partnership approach focuses on building positive relationships with both staff and young people, while also improving communication and information sharing. A key priority of this work is to identify and support vulnerable children who may be at risk of harm, exploitation, or involvement in criminal activity. By engaging regularly with care home settings, officers are better able to recognise early warning signs, safeguard those at risk, and work collaboratively with partner agencies to put appropriate interventions in place. This ongoing engagement helps to ensure that vulnerable young people receive the support and protection they need, while also contributing to the wider aim of keeping the community safe.

Independent Advisory Group

During May, Sergeant Leggate and Inspector Day attended the local Independent Advisory Group (IAG), which is made up of independent community members who provide guidance and constructive challenge to support local policing. Key issues affecting the borough were discussed, ensuring that community concerns continue to shape our work. Engagement such as this is vital to neighbourhood policing, helping us stay connected and respond effectively to the needs of our communities.



Operation Sceptre

Operation Sceptre which is a national police intensification week where police forces across the country joined together to tackle knife crime and keep our communities safe. Our officers were out in full force between 18th to 24th May 2026, working with local schools, community groups, and partner agencies to raise awareness, conduct knife sweeps, and offer safe amnesty bins for the surrender of knives. Knife crime has devastating consequences. We hear many reasons why young people might carry a knife, but the reality is simple, carrying a knife does not protect you. It puts you, and those around you, at much greater risk. Choosing to carry a weapon can result in a criminal record, prison time, serious injury, or the tragic loss of life. We want our young people to achieve their potential, which is why we are urging everyone to choose **Lives Not Knives**.

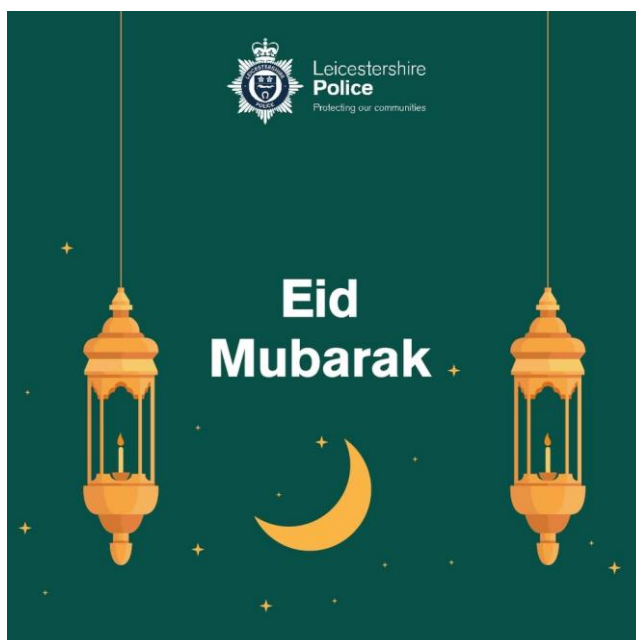
Dementia Week Event
