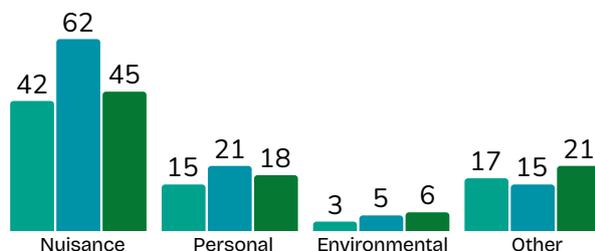

Whilst patrolling in Penarth, the Community Safety Officer engaged with a local business owner who reported that two youths had caused a disturbance inside the arcade the previous day, resulting in a loud and distressing incident. The owner advised that he attempted to report the matter via 101 but abandoned the call after waiting 45 minutes.



The Community Safety Officer provided guidance on how to report incidents online, which the owner found helpful. Following the submission of the online report, two youths were identified and addressed through the ASB process, with the consequences of their actions clearly explained to them.

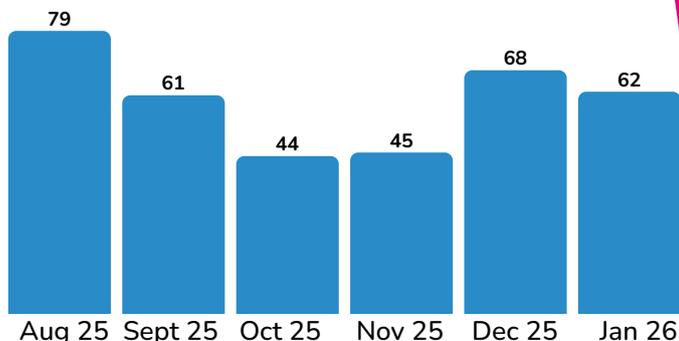
CCTV

During January **62** Incidents within the Vale of Glamorgan were captured on CCTV.



The CCTV cameras are assisting Police and the Local Authority with their investigations, the highest incidents were;

- Aggressive / Violent Behaviour
- Concern for Welfare
- Missing Person
- Concerning Behaviour
- Vehicle Incident

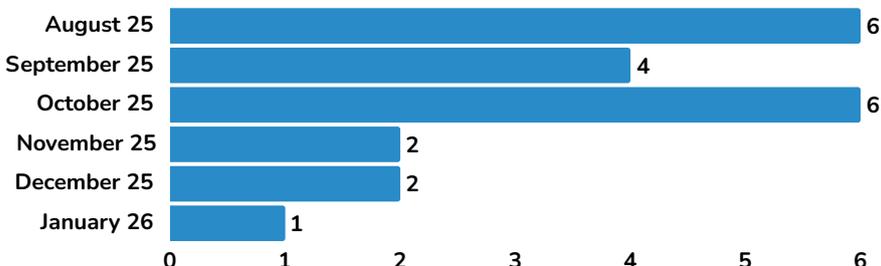
The Vale of Glamorgan Council entered a partnership with Cardiff Council and South Wales Police to maximise the effectiveness of CCTV monitoring across the region. The CCTV cameras are monitored 24/7 in Cardiff Council by CCTV trained operators.

Community Cohesion

Community Cohesion involves working with statutory agencies, third sector and communities to assist in making the Vale a Safer Place to live and to reduce the fear of crime. As part of the role, tensions within the community are monitored.

Community Engagement



In January, the Community Safety Cohesion Officer spent time at the Renew Wellbeing Café in Llantwit Major, accompanied by the South Wales Police Crime Reduction Tactical Adviser.

Together, they encouraged local residents to report any anti-social behaviour they witness and highlighted how such reports help protect and strengthen the wider community. They also provided practical, accessible advice on recognising scams and rogue traders, supporting residents to look out for themselves and their neighbours.

This engagement offered a valuable opportunity to listen, share experiences, and continue building a safer and more supportive Llantwit Major for everyone.

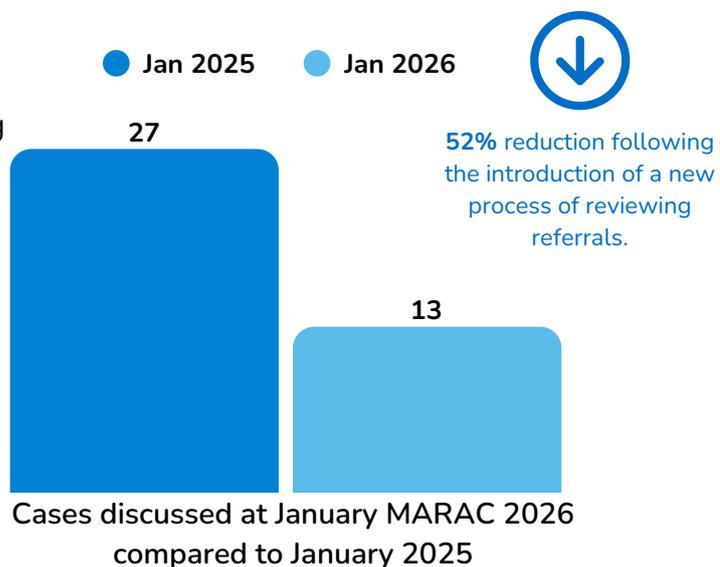
MARAC (Multi-Agency Risk Assessment Conference)

The weekly MARAC involves all key partners and stakeholders working together to create an action plan for Domestic Violence victims and their families.

 **46%** of cases discussed had children present during the incident.

 **85%** of cases discussed were referred in by South Wales Police.

 **31%** of cases discussed had links to Substance Misuse.

A Closer Look

Vale of Glamorgan - Housing Solutions Team



Homes4U

- Nearly **8,000** social housing applications.
- Banding system: **Bronze, Silver, Gold, Gold Plus.**
- Priority for:

People in **temporary accommodation (TA)**

Those in **refuge**

Young people in move on accommodation

- High turnover in **Over55** properties.

Housing Solutions / Homelessness

- Supports anyone at **risk of homelessness.**
- Moves people into **temporary accommodation** when prevention isn't possible.
- Approx. **300 TA** units, including **90** at Eagleswell Road, Llantwit Major.
- Post Covid legal changes increased demand for housing support.
- **Typical waiting times:**

Single households: **18+ months**

2bed with children: **~2 months**

3bed: **may be housed next day**

4bed: **limited availability**

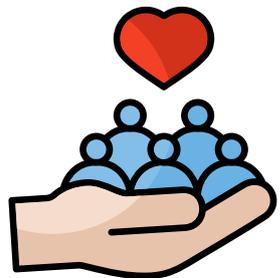


Private Rented Team

- Provides **private rental** options alongside social housing.
- Challenges due to gap between **Local Housing Allowance** and market rents.
- Mainly supports **working families**; placed **60+ households** in the last year.
- Can approach landlords to join Council schemes.

Temporary Accommodation Team (TA)

- Manages growing stock of **300 temporary accommodation units.**
- Very few voids at any given time.
- Units usually filled immediately as households move on.



- Caseworkers manage **40–60** cases each.
- All in TA are waiting for permanent accommodation; waiting lists for TA are managed within required timescales.
- Applicants from other counties can apply via **Homes4U**; priority increases with **local connection.**
- Housing larger families is particularly challenging, but significant efforts continue.
