What matters to you

We have listened to you and the concerns that have been raised through surveys, community consultations, and ongoing crime pattern analysis. With this in mind we have made the following our priorities that our efforts will be focused on this quarter:

Road Safety:

You said: Speeding vehicles on Rutland roads is a priority you want us to address across the county, but in particular the A47 corridor and it's tributaries.

What we are going to do: As before we will provide frequent overt policing to the affected areas with marked vehicle patrols, and through the use of handheld speed monitoring guns. We will also continue work with our partners in road safety in order to highlight areas of concern and request deployment of resources, and continue education and information about responsible use of the roads via our social media channels.

Anti Social Behaviour:

You said: Specific issues of ASB concerning individuals in the community, 'nuisance neighbours' and irresponsible dog ownership/walking is an area you want us to focus on.

What we are going to do: Working with our partners we will support investigations into people causing harm in our communities, and take the lead where overt criminality is involved. Through our social media channels we will continue to promote avenues to reporting issues to the most appropriate agency.

Vehicle Crime:

You said: The issue of theft of and from vehicles, and vehicles being used to commit other offences has been highlighted as a priority you want us to work on.

What we are going to do: Overt patrols of affected areas will continue, along with robust policing of suspected offenders and persons of note in line with our intelligence picture of the problem. We will continue to promote proactive ways to keep property

What we have done #yousaidwedid

November already! Rutland officers have been busy across the county this month with our regular blend of casework, responding to emergency incidents, manning the front enquiry desk at Oakham alongside all the other work we do with our partners to keep Rutland the safe and welcoming county we know it to

In South Rutland we have been stepping up our overt patrols across our villages as the evenings draw in and winter takes full hold. The benefits of patrols are clear: Visible presence acts as reassurance and deterrent, and we are also best placed to respond to anything quickly within or communities.

We have also been focusing on Road safety, with overt patrols and static points across our main routes, looking at lawful and responsible driving, and dealing with issues when they are identified.

As we move into December, Rutland officers will be engaged in foot patrols in Oakham and Uppingham across the festive period to provide visibility and reassurance to businesses and revellers, and we will continue to man our front enquiry desk Monday to Friday.

Crime trends and Prevention advice

In contrast with October, November has seen crime on the whole fall across South Rutland. Fluctuations are expected at this time of year, and annual analysis supports this being less of an impactful month for us. Vigilance is still key though, and our advice still stands as a reminder to consider long published safety and security measures to keep property safe and secure to deter would be criminals from targeting our county.

If you keep vehicles and trailers on commercial or rural sites, PLEASE try and park where they could not be reasonably or quickly removed. The more obstacles in the way, the less attractive your equipment is. It is a bind to do this every time you finish your working day, but we have seen the alternative and stolen equipment leads to lost days on sites/farms/infrastructure.

Give consideration to floodlights and particularly CCTV systems to deter criminality especially at large commercial concerns and building and renovation sites - thieves don't like to be seen at work, anything that exposes or helps to identify them is worth looking into.

At home, always consider where your keys are kept in the house. Most criminals entering properties for keys will look in the obvious places in hallways and kitchens etc, so think about keeping your keys in the more ambiguous areas.

Rutland is an inherently safe county, but we still see instances of people leaving their cars unlocked, and in some cases the keys left inside. These are golden opportunities for thieves. Please lock your cars, no matter where you leave them, and for any amount of time.

It is also worth looking at keeping car keys in 'Faraday pouches'. Technology is such that thieves can detect and copy the signal that your keys transmit to the car and enter it without the need for a physical key. A Faraday pouch blocks the signal the key transmits, making this impossible. We have seen technology utilised throughout the year.

Our villages whilst beautiful, are VERY dark at night so please remain vigilant. Ensure your doors and windows are always locked and leave lights on if you go out. Consider PIR floodlights for garage entrances and driveways where possible.

Complacency is the greatest enemy of crime prevention.
