Come along to our beat bus surgeries

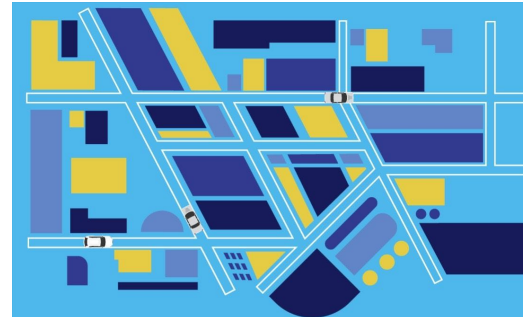

Investment fraud advice



In Northamptonshire, there has been 353 reports of investment fraud during the 12-month period, resulting in the loss of more than £5.2 million, which has prompted officers from the county's Economic Crime Unit to remind people to be vigilant when it comes to any type of fraud.
