Alcester Police SNTs. Latest Weekly Report. Sunday 1st June 2025

Based at Alcester Police Station, The Safer Neighbourhood team's primary roles are around crime prevention, problem solving both long standing or emerging issues of community concern and community engagement. We are supported at Alcester by colleagues from Patrol teams whose role is to respond to incidents and investigate crimes that occur in the area 24/7. The SNT is supervised by Inspector Hembry who leads on Neighbourhood Policing for Stratford District and Sgt Ebbs who also oversees neighbourhood Policing in the Shipston on Stour area. The Alcester SNT currently consists of 2 Police officers and 5 Police Community Support Officers, and our contact details are shown above.

Incidents of a public interest from the last week: -

ALCESTER

- Arson. Collins Way. It is suspected that a fire was set between two vehicles, both being damaged. Fire Service attended and extinguished the fire before it could spread further. 12.15am Saturday 31st May. 0009 31/05/2025. Reporting incidents to the police

Social media and messaging apps have become a useful tool in letting people know of crime, suspicious behaviour and anti-social behaviour etc to neighbours, friends and local community groups **BUT** we definitely would like to know first.

Time and information can be crucial in determining the correct response to an incident. There is also the possibility that offenders and evidence could be lost.

Our advice is – Contact us first, then consider your social media response.

Women arrested after collision in Studley.

A woman has been arrested in connection with a collision. We were called to Allendale Crescent shortly before 9pm on Thursday (29 May) after a reported collision between a car and a pedestrian. We attended along with the Ambulance Service and a man was taken to hospital where he remains in a critical condition.

A 24-year-old woman from the Alcester area was arrested by officers on suspicion of grievous bodily harm with intent. She remains in custody. Enquiries continue and anyone with information or who saw the collision is asked to contact us quoting incident number 142 of 29 May.

Two lives saved through Naloxone trial.

We've saved two lives this year as part of a pilot which sees us carry a nasal spray that brings people back from potentially fatal opioid overdoses. In February, drug and alcohol service provider Change Grow Live (CGL) trained 93 of our frontline officers to carry Nyxoid – a nasal spray version of Naloxone. We received 100 kits, made possible through Warwickshire County Council's use of central government grant funding to support such initiatives for drug and alcohol services.

Frontline officers in a variety of roles, including neighbourhood PCs and those who respond to 999 calls, have been carrying the kits since. Detective Chief Inspector Christopher Cook, who has been leading the pilot, said: "The preservation of life is at the very heart of our officers' duties, and this is an incredible step towards helping to protect vulnerable people in our communities.

"Our officers have already given Nyxoid twice since the start of this trial.

"The first incident saw officers from Nuneaton administer Nyxoid to an unconscious 40-year-old woman in the town on 1 April.

"The woman was taken to hospital having overdosed and made a full recovery.

"Then, on 25 April, Stratford officers administered Nyxoid to an unconscious 34-year-old man in Bidford-On-Avon.

"Again, the man made a full recovery after it was believed he had taken heroin.

"That is two vulnerable people who were experiencing a potentially fatal overdose who may well not be here were it not for this partnership working.

"A special thanks to Change Grow Live for not only delivering the training and supplying the Nyxoid kits, but raising awareness of the risks associated with opioids.

"I'd also like to thank our public health partners, West Midlands Ambulance Service and Warwickshire County Council, for collaborating on this project.

"Over the coming months we will be monitoring and reviewing our use of Naloxone, with a view to training up more of our officers."

Kirsten Lord, Warwickshire Services Manager for Change Grow Live, said: "Providing naloxone kits and harm reduction training to our partner agencies in Warwickshire is a vital tool in reducing the harm caused by opioids, and we're proud to support this effort, especially when it helps save lives and strengthens our local community."
