Fasting with the community

In March, officers joined their Muslim colleagues and community in participating in a daily fast as part of the Islamic holy month of Ramadhan. The aim of the fast, organised by the force's Association of Muslim Police (AMP), was to bring greater understanding and reflection on what Ramadhan means to our Muslim colleagues and community and how they go about their daily duties while fasting.



Ramadan is the ninth month of the Islamic calendar and sees Muslims engage in additional worship, self-discipline, prayer, reflection and community-focused activities. This year, it ran from the evening of Tuesday, February 17 through to Thursday, March 19, subject to the moon sighting. Officers across Northampton, Daventry and Corby undertook the fast and attended the local mosques to experience the opening of the fast in a traditional environment with the local community.

Community car meet concerns



In January, response officers were called to attend a regular car meet on Long Croft Road following repeated concerns from Little Stanion residents. Since this activity, the Corby Neighbourhood Policing Team has received no further reports regarding this issue. We would like to thank the community for their cooperation and for reporting their concerns. 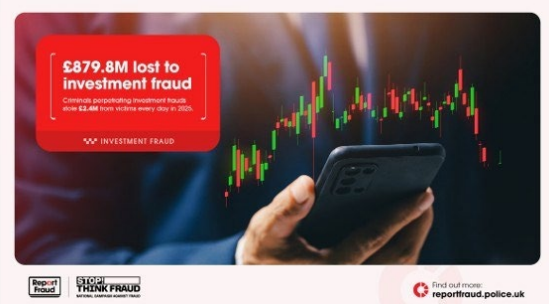
