- Stick to well-lit, busy routes
- Travel with friends where possible
- Keep your phone charged
- Drink responsibly and stay aware of your surroundings
- Pre-book taxis or arrange a lift home

If something doesn't feel right, trust your instincts.

Protect Your Vehicle

Cars and vans can be easy targets on New Year's Eve.

- Remove bags, tools, and valuables
- Lock your vehicle—even on your driveway
- Park in well-lit areas or secure car parks
- Consider using a steering lock or other visible deterrent

Criminals look for quick wins; don't give them one.

Look Out for Each Other

Community spirit is one of the strongest tools we have.

- Check in on elderly or vulnerable neighbours
- · Report suspicious behaviour promptly
- Share safety tips with friends and family

Oversharing on Social Media: Why It Matters More Than You Think

In an age where sharing online feels as natural as chatting over the garden fence, it's easy to forget just how far and fast our posts can travel. A quick update, a holiday snap, or a proud moment with the kids can seem harmless—but to the wrong person, it can be valuable information.

Oversharing on social media has become one of the most common ways criminals gather details about people's lives. They don't need to hack accounts or break into systems; they simply watch what we voluntarily put online.

What Counts as Oversharing?

Oversharing isn't just posting too often. It's sharing information that could be misused, such as:

- Announcing you're away from home or posting holiday photos in real time
- Sharing your full address, workplace, or daily routine
- · Posting images that reveal valuables, security setups, or documents
- Sharing children's names, schools, or locations
- · Accepting friend requests from people you don't actually know

Individually, these details may seem small. Together, they can paint a very clear picture.

♦ Why It's a Risk

Criminals increasingly use social media to:

- Identify empty homes
- Target individuals for scams
- Build convincing phishing messages

- Steal identities
- Track vulnerable people

Even posts meant for friends can be shared, screenshotted, or seen by others if privacy settings aren't tight.



✓ Simple Ways to Stay Safe

A few small habits can make a big difference:

- Think before you post: Would you be comfortable saying this to a stranger?
- Delay holiday photos until you're back home
- Check your privacy settings regularly
- Avoid posting personal documents or anything showing addresses, bank details, or ID
- Be selective with friend requests
- Review old posts—you may be surprised what's still visible
