Your priorities are chosen quarterly and are based upon information gathered through NHL (Neighbourhood Link), social media, local engagement, and emerging crime trends. You have stated that the following key themes are important to you.

Drug dealing/ drug taking has been identified as a beat priority	Intelligence has been received and submitted.
General ASB and Nuisance Motorbikes have been identified as a beat priority	Enquiries have been ongoing for a report of vehicles gathering and committing to anti-social driving in the woodlands areas across the village upsetting nearby livestock farms. Further enquiries are required to be completed before the beat team start to look at issuing Section 59 Notices to drivers engaging in such behaviours.
Road Safey – Speeding and Road Traffic Offences.	Officers attended an anti-social behaviour incident over in Stoney Stanton where a youth decided to arrange a house party for her friends whilst parents were away! Upon officers attendance we found approximately 40-50 people in attendance loitering in the street. These youths were dispersed, sent home and alcohol was seized and the party arranger was given stern words and their parents were informed and not at all impressed.

News

Having recently moved beats to the NH24 Fosse villages (Sapcote, Huncote, Stoney Stanton, Croft as well as other villages) along with a colleague, PC Marvell has taken the last few weeks to not only get acquainted with the area but to meet some of the many great people living in the area. He has recently attended a beat surgery kindly supported by Sapcote garden centre which gave him a fantastic opportunity to listen and understand some of the issues residents have experienced. This also allowed a crime prevention opportunity and to share beneficial information.



A recent spate of burglaries have occurred so we urge residents to consider leaving a light(s) on when and where possible. We have attended a number of neighbour disputes which we have assisted in mediation and have already been made aware of a number of traffic related issues which will be investigated in due course. Since we moved to the Fosse Villages beat, we have attended numerous addresses throughout the villages and dealt with neighbour disputes and liaised with Housing Associations. A patch walk has been arranged with EMH Housing off the back of this which we look forward to conducting next year.




And finally, whilst crewed up with PCSO 6120 Tebbett from the NH20 Beat, we assisted officers after a report of a vehicle which had collided with a residents wall over in Croft on Dovecote Road. It transpired that the driver had become lost down this narrow, dead end road and made contact with the wall. Upon officers attendance, the driver was breathalysed and found to be over three times the legal limit. The driver was subsequently arrested and taken to custody while PCSO Yeatman and PCSO Tebbett

waited with the vehicle to be recovered, CCTV was obtained and a witness statement was taken.
