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Alcester Police SNTs. Latest Weekly Report. Sunday 28th June 2026

Based at Alcester Police Station, The Safer Neighbourhood team's primary roles are around crime prevention, problem solving both long standing or emerging issues of community concern and community engagement. We are supported at Alcester by colleagues from Patrol teams whose role is to respond to incidents and investigate crimes that occur in the area 24/7. The SNT is supervised by Inspector Jake Kibblewhite who leads on Neighbourhood Policing for Stratford District and Sgt Ebbs who also oversees neighbourhood Policing in the Shipston on Stour area. The Alcester SNT currently consists of Police officers and Police Community Support Officers, and our contact details are shown above.

ALCESTER

Disputes with neighbours

We don't always see eye-to-eye with our neighbours, but in most cases simply talking peacefully to one another is the best way to solve a problem. However, if talking hasn't worked or you can't discuss the issue with your neighbour, find out how you can get help to resolve the issue.

Common types of neighbour disputes

Living in such close proximity to one another, it's no surprise that disputes with neighbours can get heated quite quickly. The most common ones relate to:

- noise, such as loud music and barking dogs.
- parking
- property boundaries
- overgrowing trees and hedges
- children playing in the street.

It's important to note that most of these cases are not matters for the police, although there are some circumstances when you should contact us. You can read more information on who to report matters to below.

What is the impact?

Disagreements between neighbours, however small, can fester over time and do lasting damage to your relationships in the long term. That's why we would always encourage you to raise your concerns with one another and find amicable solutions as early as possible. If you can't resolve a dispute with a neighbour, it can really wear you down. This can have a serious effect on your quality of life, especially if it leads to you feeling threatened, isolated or scared in your own home or community. If this is the case, we would strongly advise you to take action using the steps below.

What you can do

Our first advice is always to talk to your neighbour if possible and try to resolve the issue peacefully. If you have a difference of opinion, see if you can find a compromise that works for both of you, such as no loud music after 11pm. [More advice on resolving neighbour disputes.](#)

If talking hasn't worked

If you live in rented property or social housing, your landlord or housing association may be able to help you.

If the problem involves noise, such as a loud party or dogs barking, please contact your [local council](#) as this isn't a police matter.

For disagreements over boundary walls, fences, trees or hedges, contact [Citizens Advice](#) for free information and support.

In some cases, you may also want to contact a solicitor. You can also refer to government guidance on the [Party Wall etc Act 1996](#).

Overview

Follow these steps if you have a dispute with your neighbour.

1. Try to solve the problem informally by [talking to them](#).
2. If your neighbour is a tenant, you could [contact their landlord](#).
3. You could use a [mediation service](#) if raising the issue informally does not work.
4. If the dispute involves a statutory nuisance (something like loud music or barking dogs), you can make a [complaint to your local council](#).
5. [Contact the police](#) if your neighbour is breaking the law by being violent or harassing you.
6. As a last resort you can take [legal action through the courts](#).
