Murder investigation launched in Seaford

Detectives at British Transport Police (BTP) have launched a murder investigation after a boy sadly died at Seaford railway station on Wednesday evening.



Officers were called to the station around 5pm on 10 September following reports of a stabbing.

Sussex Police officers attended alongside BTP officers and paramedics, and a young man was found with a serious injury, consistent with being stabbed.

Despite the best efforts of paramedics, the 16-year-old boy was sadly pronounced dead at the scene. His next of kin have been informed.

A 16-year-old boy has been arrested on suspicion of murder and remains in custody at this time. Enquiries are ongoing at pace to establish the full

circumstances of the incident.

BTP Detective Chief Inspector Paul Stanley said: "This is a shocking incident which has resulted in the tragic loss of a young man this evening. The investigation remains in the early stages and the station will remain closed while we continue our enquiries in the area.

"I would urge anyone who may have witnessed what happened, or the lead up to it, to get in touch as you may have vital information which could help our investigation.

Pheasant poaching appeal

Our Sussex Police Rural Crime Team received a report of pheasant poaching on private farmland between Lewes and Ringmer, on Thursday 4 September at around 6.30pm.

Officers attended the scene and located three men they wished to speak to in relation to the incident. Following a pursuit on foot with assistance from local gamekeepers, the men were detained and searched.



They were all subsequently released.


Officers are pursuing a number of lines of enquiry in an ongoing investigation.

Inspector Andrew Barker said: "It is illegal to hunt game birds on private land, outside of their open season and without a firearms license.

"We encourage anyone who witnessed the incident or who has relevant information such as CCTV or mobile footage to report it to us."

Vehicle thefts - Toyota Hilux

Toyota Hilux owners in East Sussex are being warned to remain vigilant after recent reports of vehicle thefts.

Police are advising owners to review their vehicle security, storage, and parking locations.

It follows reports that Toyota Hiluxes have been specifically targeted by thieves in recent weeks.

Detective Inspector Gavin Patch from East Sussex said: "We are aware of an increase in reports of thefts and damage to Toyota Hiluxes in the area.

"We are taking action and focusing resources on this issue. Officers are working hard to target known offenders and to recover vehicles.

"We understand the impact that vehicle theft has on owners and the potential resulting anti-social behaviour in our communities from those driving stolen vehicles.

"We encourage everyone to report vehicle thefts and to provide information about these incidents to support our work."



Tips to protect your car:

- Park your vehicle in sight of your home or inside a garage; or where there is street lighting or CCTV.
- Use a visible steering lock to deter thieves and prevent the steering wheel from being turned.
- Consider 'blocking' the vehicle in with a second car or fitting a secondary immobiliser.
- Reprogramme keys if you buy a second hand car, or check that the key blade is cut and works, by testing it.

Police have located and recovered a number of stolen vehicles in East Sussex, but each incident serves as a reminder for owners to take precautions.

If you see or witness anyone acting suspiciously around parked vehicles in your community, report it to police at the time by either calling 101, or reporting online www.sussex.police.uk quoting Operation Aldwich.
