STOP! THINK FRAUD

NATIONAL CAMPAIGN AGAINST FRAUD

Operation Pacify


Three years ago, the Corby Neighbourhood Policing Team launched a dedicated operation to clamp down on motorcycle nuisance and its associated anti-social behaviour in the town. Operation Pacify was set up in response to concerns from businesses and residents, whose lives had been blighted by motorcycles being ridden recklessly and dangerously in public spaces as well as on the roads. Since its introduction, and mainly thanks to community intelligence, the team has seized motorcycles and prosecuted riders for various traffic and vehicle crime offences. Community intelligence has been key to the success of the on-going campaign, and the team is appealing to people to continue to provide information, including sightings, dash-cam, doorbell and mobile phone footage to help identify offenders.

Courier fraud advice

Officers at Northamptonshire Police are encouraging people to make their elderly relatives or vulnerable members of the community aware of courier fraud after two incidents last week. The latest incidents occurred predominantly in the north of the county after elderly people in Corby, Rushden, Oundle and Wellingborough were contacted by fraudsters claiming to be police officers from the Met and Scotland Yard. Fraudsters tend to target a specific area over a short period, which has prompted officers from the Force's Economic Crime Unit to raise awareness of the recent incidents in a bid to prevent any further victims. It does matter

The 'It Does Matter' campaign launched on November 25 last year, aimed at raising awareness of, and encouraging victims, to report non-contact sexual offences, which have previously been overlooked as forms of violence against women and girls (VAWG). Over the period, Northamptonshire Police used Live Facial Recognition (LFR) cameras for the first time in three town centres to help proactively target those at risk of committing offences against women and girls, resulting in six arrests and checks on further individuals. Alongside the campaign, the proactive policing initiative Operation Kayak, was also promoted, working closely with pubs and clubs, street pastors, Northampton Guardians, and volunteers who work on the Safer Nights Out Van (SNO van), to ensure the vulnerable are looked after and safeguarded. Tackling violence against women and girls is a priority for Northamptonshire Police and this awareness raising campaign is part of wider work to protect and safeguard those at risk of abuse and sexual assault. Drink and drug driving campaign

On December 1 2025, the annual month-long winter drink and drug driving campaign launched. Alongside Operation Limit, the campaign aims to deliver a clear message on the consequences of driving while under the influence of alcohol and drugs across social media channels. In addition to the online campaign, the Roads Policing and Safer Roads Teams also carried out extra patrols throughout December and into the New Year, with the support of colleagues from Response, Neighbourhood Policing, and the Special Constabulary. Drink and drug driving is one of the main contributors in collisions and is one of the fatal five driving offences, alongside careless driving, not wearing a seat belt, excessive speed, and using a mobile phone whilst behind the wheel. Tackling knife crime

During the Sceptre week of action in November 2025, departments from across Northamptonshire Police came together to tackle and highlight the issues of knife crime, visiting schools, youth groups and holding knife amnesties as part of a national week of action. During the week, 198 knives were recovered from amnesty bins/handed in, and 37 weapons sweeps were conducted, finding 16 weapons. Read more [here](#).
