The ongoing priorities for NE11 Rushey Mead beat are:

- Work in collaboration with our communities and partners to tackle road safety related issues.
- In collaboration with communities and partners work to tackle hate crime, increase reporting, and to build trust and confidence in Leicestershire Police.
- In collaboration with Leicester City Council, and other partners to reduce Anti-Social Behaviour on our green spaces, on the Rushey Fields associated with cricket and alcohol.
- In collaboration with our partners and the community to tackle and reduce burglaries.

FRAUD AWARENESS

There has been a recent rise in Artificial intelligence videos of people pretending to be trusted members of the community giving false investment advice, such as online videos of Martin Lewis. Please be aware that these videos among many others are false and misleading and are a scam.

Please do not click on any links that are being shown in the videos as they are not who they say they are.

Prevention tips to be aware of:

- Guard your passwords – avoid predictable options like birthdays or pet names.
- Watch out for calls – Be wary of unsolicited calls, emails and texts. Callers will pretend to be your bank and try and access your details via the phone.
- Enable Two-factor authentication – Add an extra layer of security to your accounts by enabling two-factor authentication. It can stop hackers even if they get your password.
- Report suspicious activity – If you suspect fraud, report it to your bank, Action Fraud, or local authorities.
