#### Tips for making other people feel safer on the streets.

Some of this advice might seem obvious, but there are some simple things we can do to help other people feel safer when they're out in public.

Keep your distance - When walking behind someone, particularly at night, try to leave a good amount of distance between yourself and the person ahead of you. Remember that the closer you are, the more threatening you might seem.

Don't stare - A stranger staring at you can be intimidating and unsettling. Focus on something else to show you're not a threat. Look out of the window, message a friend, or read a book or newspaper.

Cross the road - Somebody running up behind you, particularly at night, can be frightening. If you're out for an evening run, or walk, and see someone walking ahead, cross the road, call out to let them know you're about to run by them or make sure to leave a good amount of space when you pass them.

Keep comments to yourself - What you might think of as just a bit of fun, or flattery, can be insulting, upsetting or even scary to someone else. Keep any comments or opinions to yourself.

Keep your friends in line - If you're in a group of people where someone is harassing another person on the street, try to calm the situation. They may just need to be told that they're behaving inappropriately.

Be an active bystander - If you notice someone is uncomfortable with another person's behaviour, show your support by being an active bystander. It can be as simple as standing between a person and their harasser to block their line of sight. Ask that person if they need any help, and back up anyone else who is intervening. intervening.

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# Warwickshire Road Safety Partnership backs new national website to protect young drivers.

We are proud to back a new national website dedicated to uniting efforts to cut the high number of crashes involving young drivers in Britain.

Hosted by the Parliamentary Advisory Council for Transport Safety (PACTS), the website - www.protectyoungdrivers.com - brings together essential information on protecting young and novice drivers, who are at an increased risk of collision on the roads.

Key factors known to increase crash risk include carrying similar-aged passengers, driving at night and risky behaviour - such as speeding or overtaking unsafely.

The website features key facts, timelines, international comparisons, research, lived experience from bereaved families and links to major reports and campaigns - all designed to help inform media, policymakers, MPs, practitioners and the public.

Collectively, we are committed to preventing lives being lost on our roads. This new website provides a national platform for real life experiences, research and key facts about progressive driving licenses, which have been proven to protect young drivers internationally, and make our roads safer."



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#### Keeping your bike safe: motorbike theft prevention

Motorbikes, mopeds and scooters are often targeted by opportunistic thieves because they are fast getaway vehicles and can be easier to conceal than something larger, like a car or van. We, and other UK police forces, are united in our simple message: a multi-layered approach to security is the best way to protect your bike. By combining physical deterrents with good parking choices and proactive registration, riders can significantly reduce their risk of becoming a victim of crime.

Here's a few top tips and some guidance:

Three actions form the basis of effective motorcycle security: Lock, Chain, Cover. Treat it like a mantra whenever you park your bike!

Lock: always use a physical lock, never rely on the steering lock alone. A combination of locks makes a thief's job very difficult. Small, portable disc locks that attach to the brake disc prevent the wheel from urning, and some models feature an alarm as an added deterrent. D or U-locks are a strong option, locking the front wheel, while grip locks secure brake and throttle controls, immobilising the bike.

Chain: choose an immovable object and a high-quality chain to secure your bike — something like a ground anchor, street furniture, lamppost or sturdy ralings (only if parking regulations allow, of course). Leaving slack in the chain or letting it rest on the ground makes it easier for thieves to use tools like angle grinders; keep the chain tight and off the ground, threading it through the bike's rear wheel and frame for maximum security. Thatcham or Sold Secure Approved chains have been tested and offer a higher level of protection.

Cover: a cheap, simple cover can be one of the most effective deterrents. It conceals the make and model from thieves who may be 'shopping' for a specific type, keeps it out of sight and out of mind and adds an obstacle in terms of time and effort for a thief who would have to get it off before they can even access any looks.

Parking and storage — where you leave it is just as important as how you secure it. Reduce thiev
