Rural Burglary Prevention Advice





There have been several burglaries reported in the rural areas of the Dover District. Rural areas can be attractive to offenders due to isolation and limited natural surveillance, but there are simple steps you can take to protect your property:

- **Secure your property:** Ensure doors, windows, gates, and outbuildings are locked when not in use. Fit good-quality locks and consider additional security such as alarms and sensor lighting.
- **Protect tools and machinery:** Mark valuable items with a forensic marking kit or property marking system and keep a record of serial numbers. Store equipment out of sight where possible.
- **Use lighting and CCTV:** Motion-activated lighting and cameras can act as a strong deterrent and help identify offenders.
- **Be aware of vehicles:** Report unfamiliar vehicles or people acting suspiciously, particularly in more remote areas. Take note of registration numbers where safe to do so.
- **Join local schemes:** Consider joining or setting up a rural or farm watch scheme to share information quickly with neighbours and police.
- **Limit visibility:** Avoid leaving ladders, tools, or keys accessible, and try not to advertise when you're away from home.
- **Report information:** If something doesn't feel right, trust your instincts and report it. In an emergency call 999, otherwise report via 101 or online.

Working together and staying vigilant helps keep our rural communities safe.
