We are delighted that Sergeant Andy Prowse has joined the Reigate and Banstead Police Safer Neighbourhood Team.

Sergeant Prowse will be focusing on the North of the Borough and he will join Sergeant Chris Madeley -Central and Sergeant Sarah Kiely – South area. Inspector Jon Vale is the Borough Commander. Our Safer Neighbourhood team is formed of Police Constables (PCs), Police Community Support Officers (PCSOs), an Office Manager and Volunteers. In our forthcoming Newsletters we will be introducing the team to you.

Safer Neighbourhood Teams

Neighbourhood policing within Surrey Police is delivered by Safer Neighbourhood Teams in each of the 11 districts and boroughs of the County. Each neighbourhood within the districts and boroughs is served by a dedicated team of officers and staff.

Neighbourhood Teams provide community engagement, targeted foot patrols and collaborative problem solving to tackle the issues that cause the greatest harm in our communities. Teams are made of Sergeants, Police Officers and PCSOs, led by the Borough Commander, with further support provided by other team members - with specialisms in youth engagement, licensing and crime prevention.



Making the Railways Safer

You may have seen a lot of police activity at Redhill train station on Friday and Saturday night during the weekend of 31st January – 1st February.

Surrey officers were working alongside British Transport Police and the Metropolitan Police to target anyone who might be using the rail network for criminality.

The operation resulted in multiple drugs seizures, recovery of stolen goods, and four arrests for offences including theft, assault, sexual assault and breach of a court order.

We'll keep doing this kind of pro-active work to keep our communities safe and deny criminals easy use of our railways to carry out their activities. #SaferRedhill

Valentines Day be Romance Fraud Aware

Romance scams involve people being duped into sending money to criminals who go to great lengths to gain their trust and convince them that they are in a genuine relationship. They use language to manipulate, persuade and exploit so that requests for money do not raise alarm bells. These requests might be highly emotive, such as criminals claiming they need money for emergency medical care, or to pay for transport costs to visit the victim if they are overseas. Scammers will often build a relationship with their victims over time. This practical guide highlights common tactics used in romance fraud.

Signs your friend or family member may be involved in a romance scam:

•They may be very secretive about their relationship or provide excuses for why their online partner has not video called or met them in person. They might become hostile or angry, and withdraw from conversation when you ask any questions about their partner.

•They may express very strong emotions and commitment to someone they have only just met.

•They have sent, or are planning to send, money to someone they have not met face-to-face. They may take out loans or withdraw from their pension to send money.

How users can stay safe from romance scams:

•Be suspicious of any requests for money from someone you have never met in person, particularly if you have only recently met online.

•Speak to your family or friends to get advice.

•Profile photos may not be genuine, do your research first. Performing <u>a reverse image search</u> on a search engine can find photos that have been taken from somewhere, or someone, else.

It is important that no matter how long you've been speaking to someone online and how much you think you trust them, if you have not met them in person it's important that you do not:

- Send them any money
- Allow them access to your bank account
- Transfer money on their behalf
- Take a loan out for them
- Provide copies of your personal documents such as passports or driving licenses
- Invest your own money on their behalf or on their advice
- Purchase and send the codes on gift cards from Amazon or iTunes
- Agree to receive and/or send parcels on their behalf (laptops, mobile phones etc.)

Contact your bank immediately and report it to Action Fraud on 0300 123 2040 or via actionfraud.police.uk. If you are in Scotland, please report to Police Scotland directly by calling 101.

During the amnesty, those handing in a Turkish-manufactured TVBF will not face prosecution for the illegal possession and will not have to give their details.

However, the history of any live firearms handed

in will be checked for evidence of its use in crime. Other unwanted, unlicensed firearms and ammunition may be surrendered to police at any time following normal firearms surrender processes.

Top-Venting Blank Firers can be handed in at the following police stations across the county:

Guildford Police Station, Margaret Road, Guildford, GU14QS (open daily 8am-10pm)

Staines Police Station, Kingston Road, Staines, TW18 4LQ (open daily 8am-10pm)

Caterham Police Station, Timber Hill Road, Caterham, CR3 6LD (open daily 8am-10pm)

The crime statistics for the last 3 months show a decrease in the number of reported actual residential burglaries. After a recent increase in the level of keyless car thefts, there has been a decrease in the last three months. Although not shown, there were 16 reported incidents of Personal Fraud (Scams) in January 2025 in the Borough.
